GEOGRAPHY

As Geographers we will show an understanding of the different types of settlements that were built up during the Stone Age. We will study the ways in which people used the land and its natural resources to help them survive.

ART

To know about the unknown artists of the Stone Age

Replicate Stone Age cave paintings such as 'The Cave of Hands' in Argentina and Lascaux Cave using printing and sculpture techniques

Make Stone Age paint to draw pictures and symbols. Stonehenge landscape

SCIENCE

Rocks - linked to The Stone Age

Compare and group together different kinds of rocks on the basis of their appearance and simple physical properties Describe in simple terms how fossils are formed when things that have lived are trapped within rock Recognise that soils are made from rocks and organic matter.

Light - link to fire and shadows of the Stone Age

Recognise that they need light in order to see things and that dark is the absence of light

Notice that light is reflected from surfaces

Recognise that light from the sun can be dangerous and that

there are ways to protect their eyes

Recognise that shadows are formed when the light from a light source is blocked by a solid object (Early sundials from

the Bronze Age)
