The woman, who lives next door, has a son my age.

The first sentence **does not** have a relative clause  
The relative clause in the second sentence is underlined.

A relative clause adds information and detail to a sentence.

Look at these sentences and notice that this time the relative clause  
starts with 'when'.

July is my favourite time of the year.

July, when the sun usually shines, is my favourite time of the year.

A relative clause can begin with: who, which, where, when, whose or  
that
