> "You silly man!" she shouted, unaware of the fact that he was the king. "You have let the cakes burn and now there is nothing for supper!"


> > We don't know if Alfred got anything to eat that night; we do know he

1) How do we know from the first paragraph that King Alfred was a good king?

3) When he knocks on the woman's door, what two things does he ask for?

Food and a place to stay for the night.

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4) The woman 'took pity on him'. What does this mean?

She felt sorry for him / she felt she should help him.

5) Why do you think she took pity on him?

He was dirty and bedraggled / He was hungry / lost / homeless.

6) What does the woman ask King Alfred to do?
